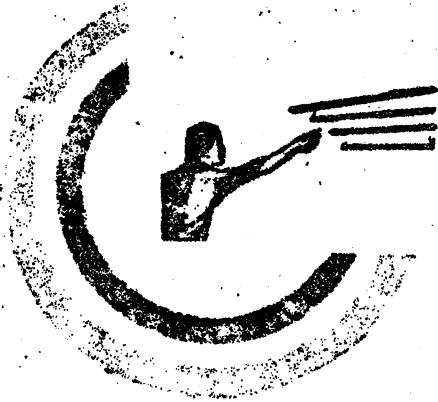

"THE BEAT OF A DIFFERENT DRUM"

Those of you that have traveled west no doubt have seen numerous advertisements to visit old ghost mining towns. Of course, many of these are tourist spots, catering to the families that travel each year. Few vacationers have ever heard of Crown King, Arizona however. This old mining town is isolated from the main travel routes, so it has changed very little in the past few decades.

Travel to Crown King is difficult at best. Located approximately 80 miles from Phoenix or Prescott, Crown King is on a mountain surrounded by a crown of mountains. About 28 miles from the town, the paved road ends, and from then on one must travel a narrow, winding, treacherous dirt road.

Crown King seems rather remote, but it has advantages not found in other places. Five miles away is a mountain top which affords a view of Mexico, California, and the San Francisco Peaks. Also, 150 miles away one can see Flagstaff, the lights of Phoenix at night, and a mountain 250 miles away in New Mexico. The climate is very pleasant but extremely dry. The temperatures are much like those in Indiana except in the wintertime when the average daytime temperature is 50°. Because of the 6000 ft altitude, nights are very cold. It is interesting that in only 13 miles, the altitude drops to 2500 ft., the vegetation changes from Ponderosa Pines to Saguaro Cactus, and the temperatures become like those of Phoenix.

There is no industry there, but jobs are provided by the general store and gas pump (regular only), the bar, bottled gas distributors, and the ranger station. There is no radio station nor ham operators. But, with an altitude of 6000 ft. radio and TV signals are excellent from Phoenix and Flagstaff. The town boasts three telephones -- Crown King 1 (The Ranger Station), Crown King 2 (The Bunkhouse), and Crown King 3 (the pay phone at the general store), which are provided by the Prescott exchange 80 miles away.

Several retired miners live in this small town. At the edge of town are many vacant houses which are either for sale, or used as summer cabins by people from Phoenix. Seven miles from town is a state park called Horsetheif Basin. On weekends, the hazardous dirt road becomes even more dangerous as tourists come to take advantage of horseback riding, fishing, and camping.

Crown King has seven children who go to a one-room public school which serves kindergarten through grade 8. A private girls reformatory called "The Bunkhouse" is nearby. Until 1 1/2 years ago, the state had no place to send girls in trouble (except to the reformatories in California). Now, a few of them (up to 24) can be sent to the home-like, camp-like, atmosphere.

Why do we tell you about Crown King, Arizona?? Because Arnie and I need your prayers in the weeks to come. Soon we will be a part of this small community- Arnie to the one room shhool, and I to assist him and develope a music program. I will also be assisting the 24 girls at the reformatory teaching music and drama, and counseling with them. We would like to start a church there also, because they have none.

With these things in mind, we very much need God's guidance....Please pray for us.

Besides the budget you must plan your social activities. I suggest at least one night out a week with the boys and an afternoon for the wife. (Unless of course, she is working).


Well John, my wife said if I don't quit this she is going to give your wife some advice, tell Brenda I said "Hi".
